

PASTOR'S PAGE

Dear friends in Christ,

Sometimes the season of the calendar year seems to fit perfectly with the celebrations of the church year. Like with Easter, the season we are moving toward the end of this month—all of the new growth, new life, the renewing of the earth all around us seems to preach its own sermon to us about the resurrection of Jesus and God's ability to create new life.

Other times, though, there's a bit of a mismatch. On May 19, we will celebrate the festival of Pentecost. The date of Pentecost changes year to year, depending on when Easter falls, but it's always somewhere mid-May to mid-June. Which means we celebrate Pentecost when our rhythms are shifting from the busyness of the spring to the slower pace of the summer. This year, Pentecost is the last day of our regular worship schedule before we switch, on Memorial Day weekend, to one service at 9:00 a.m. for the rest of the summer. It's the last day of Sunday school. People start traveling more, and the church calendar gets a little less full.

But Pentecost is not at all about endings or anything slowing down! The experience of Pentecost in the book of Acts is the launching of the church into mission. The disciples have been gathered together, waiting, praying, and then all at once the Holy Spirit arrives. The Spirit blows through the room and sends the disciples out, filling their mouths with words the diverse crowds outside can understand, all about what God has done in Jesus Christ. Many who hear believe, repent, and are baptized. Acts 2 ends by saying, "And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved."

This is traditionally understood to be the "birthday" of the church. It is how God fulfills Jesus' promise to the disciples from Acts 1:8: "You will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." And indeed, that's what we see happening. The Holy Spirit leads those who have come to believe in Jesus to bear witness, and the church moves out in mission.

We are still today in the age of the mission of the church. The Spirit is still equipping us and sending us out. We do need

seasons of rest, of course—I'm not suggesting we fill the calendar full of activities this summer. But I invite us all to remember as we celebrate Pentecost this year that God's mission is not taking a break but is unfolding all around us. God is sending us to welcome, to embody Christ's love, to serve, to share our gifts, to love like Jesus, in and through all the seasonal rhythms of our lives. We, like the early disciples, are witnesses to the love of God made known in Jesus; may the Holy Spirit fill our mouths and move our feet to share the good news, wherever we find ourselves.

America netted the food pantry 26,685 pounds of food; 11,794 pounds were meat. That alone is amazing! Weis Market on White Street donated 5,684 pounds of food, of which 4,022 pounds were meat. Rutters Farm Store donated 1,908 pounds of packaged sandwiches, salads, fruit, dessert, and snacks.

While we are very blessed to have these resources available to us, we are still looking for companies and work places to hold food

WOW! SINCERE THANKS

from Linda Eisenhart to a Wonderful Paradise Crew for the Easter meals distribution!! We served over 275 families which was over 1026 individuals!! Woohoo!! It was a beautiful day weather-wise, too, and some of us may have gotten a little more sun than expected! Whoops! © We teamed up with Paradise ECC to cover the distribution from 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. with our volunteers starting at 8:30 to begin pulling the items for the bags and staying later than 5:00 to help any "running late" neighbors receive their food.

In looking ahead for this year's **Summer Food Program** for the children, our date for distribution is Monday, June 10, from noon to 5 p.m. There are two shifts: 10:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. and 1:45 to 5:15 p.m. We overlap the shifts, so that the second shift

can ease into the first shift jobs with no problems. Last year we distributed 2758 lunches. [wow!] Approximately 6-7 volunteers would work for each shift. We will be having a potluck lunch at the pantry that day for everyone working. If you would be willing to volunteer for a shift for distribution, please let Linda know. Also, if you would like to bring something to share for lunch, that would be wonderful.

Looking at the first quarter of this year (not including the Easter numbers) in comparison to last year's first quarter, we served about 945 more adults, children and seniors! That is a staggering number! Imagine, as volunteers, that the 3 hours a month, MIND YOU, that is JUST 3 hours a month that you are at the pantry, how much of a difference you make in the lives of our neighbors in need. As you see, there is definitely a NEED, otherwise, the pantry would be out of business! The demand for help with food has increased for those who are food-insecure. I cannot
